PEEL BRIGHT MINDS

As foreshadowed at the Peel Regional Leaders Forum meeting of 9th March 2018 Regional Development Australia Peel (RDA) is seeking your Local Government's financial support for this initiative for a period of 3 years commencing on 1st July 2018.

Background

The Peel Bright Minds (PBM) initiative came about due to the need to prepare our population for the future workforce. This is applicable to not just our region's young people, but to everyone of working age.

Almost five million Australian jobs - around 40 per cent of the workforce - face the high probability of being replaced by computers and other technology in the next 10 to 15 years.

In response to future workforce challenges Peel Bright Minds was initiated by RDA with support from the Peel Development Commission, Peel-Harvey Catchment Council and the Inspiring Australia Regional Hubs Program.

Internationally it has been recognised that high-quality science, technology, engineering and mathematics (STEM) education is critically important for our current and future productivity, as well as for informed personal decision making and effective community, national and global citizenship.

STEM is an approach to learning and development that integrates the areas of science, technology, engineering and mathematics. Through STEM, students develop key skills including: problem solving; creativity; critical analysis; teamwork; independent thinking; initiative; communication; digital literacy.

At a regional level it was identified that in addition to STEM there was a requirement to add the following elements to stem:

E – Entrepreneurship – To recognise the need for individuals to create their own jobs. This will require entrepreneurial skills and aptitudes.

A – Arts – To recognise that combining arts education with STEM education can provide vital skills such as critical reasoning, problem solving, time management, communication and presentation skills. In addition, design is an important ingredient in innovation. Not only must things be functional, they must be aesthetically pleasing as well

In the Peel region Peel Bright Minds recognises that the Transform Peel initiative will fundamentally change the make up of our workforce. One of the key objectives of Peel Bright Minds is to provide people with the skills that employers will demand and that can be the focus of targeted workforce development to satisfy the needs identified in the Transform Peel Workforce Skills Analysis Report.

These include work readiness in terms of work ethic, attitudes, willingness to learn and communication, as well as basic skills and understanding in science, technology, engineering, mathematics and information communication technology (ICT).

Progress to Date

Following initial workshops and consultation a project steering group formed and developed a "Theory of Change" document to guide development of the Peel Bright Minds initiative.

RDA was successful in obtaining seed funding for Peel Bright Minds from Inspiring Australia, matched by funding from RDA, Peel Development Commission and Peel-Harvey Catchment Council.

In January 2018 Charlotte (Charlie) Jones was employed on a part time basis to:

- Plan, coordinate and execute events, forums and meetings.
- Conduct an environmental scan of ESTEAM activities, stakeholders and participants in the Peel region.
- Maintain currency, accuracy and relevance of the Peel Bright Minds Website and social media.

- Establish and maintain partnerships with members, stakeholders and the ESTEAM community.
- Establish and create an effective Client Relationship Management database.
- Prepare, submit and manage grant and sponsorship applications.
- Promote the Peel Bright Minds vision and represent the group at meetings and events.
- Compile progress and administrative reports as required by the Peel Bright Minds Steering Group.
- Arrange meetings of the Peel Bright Minds Steering Group and record and distribute records of meetings.

ABOUT PEEL BRIGHT MINDS

CURRENT SITUATION IN PEEL

- Technology and jobs are changing at a rapid rate
- Peel people will need to adapt to have the necessary skills and characteristics for the future workforce
- Engagement, education and capability building in Entrepreneurship, Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts and Maths (ESTEAM) acknowledged as important for future jobs
- While some are highly engaged, many people do not have positive perceptions or engagement with ESTEAM
- There many existing assets and actors in ESTEAM, but they are not always well connected and promoted
- The lack of engagement/understanding of ESTEAM also contributes to a limited use of evidence-based decision-making in organisations
- Peel Bright Minds has established with seed funding from RDA Peel, along with funding from Inspiring Australia, Peel Development Commission and Peel Harvey Catchment Council

To date Peel Bright Minds has:

- Formally launched at a stakeholder event attended by approximately 50 people at Make Place in Mandurah (February 2018).
- Progressed on conducting an 'ESTEAM Environmental Scan' to identify the current status; gaps and opportunities; and expected benefits around strengthening regional engagement in ESTEAM and citizen science. The environmental scan involves stakeholder discussions across the region, as well as analysis of key documents and strategies.
- Organised science engagement activities to be delivered at a stall at Mandurah Crab Fest (March 17th and 18th 2018).
- Established an online presence with a website (<u>www.peelbrightminds.com.au</u>) and Facebook page (<u>www.fb.com/PeelBrightMinds</u>), and delivered communications relating to ESTEAM and citizen science on these platforms and via newsletters.
- Prepared implementation plans and commenced preparation to deliver a series of Science Café events, an interactive arts activity at Stretch Festival, Innovators' Tea Party for Peel Bright Minds (STEM speed networking), ESTEAM Awards, industry tours, and initiate an ESTEAM Champions network for teachers by June 30th 2018.
